


Westmore Association Board Members


Lake Willoughby Water Programs

Greeter & Milfoil Program: By Katherine Busby, Greeter Program Coordinator

Our Greeter season ran from Memorial Day to Labor Day. We had 8 Greeters in the program, and we were able to inspect approximately 4,000 watercrafts this summer. Most boats our Greeters inspected and found plant material on were upon retrieval from Lake Willoughby and had invasive Eurasian Water Milfoil removed. Our Greeter Program helped to keep Lake Willoughby free of invasive species and protected other bodies of water.

Swampguana Diving Services suction harvested aquatic invasive Eurasian Water Milfoil starting in July and will continue their efforts through October. They removed Milfoil from the Boat Launch, Crescent Beach, Gallagher's Cabins, NE Shoreline/WilloughVale, NW Shoreline/North Beach and Gray Rock to the Boat Launch. No other invasive species were reported so far. They will submit a final report when harvesting is completed. The Milfoil Management Program results from previous years show a significant yearly reduction in the spread of invasive Milfoil and the importance it has for aquatic nuisance control in Lake Willoughby.

Thanks to the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation and with the help of the Memphremagog Watershed Association, the Town of Westmore received 40% of the grant award amount so far, including \$2294 for the Greeter Program and \$2,714 for the Milfoil Management Program. The Westmore Association provides a 50% match for the Greeter Program.



Scholarship Committee Report

This year the Westmore Association was pleased to be able to increase the amount of the stipend to \$1,500 per student. In addition, we offered this scholarship to students enrolled in post graduate work.

Trail Projects

This summer we were once again able to collaborate with the NorthWoods Stewardship Center and the Vermont Forest, Parks, and Recreation to continue addressing priority trail and recreation needs. This summer we focused primarily on supporting two key activities: Restoration to the Bald Mountain Camp (including interior painting, clean up, roof patching, some interior remodel, privy restoration, etc.) and maintenance to the Westmore Town Forest. This work could not have been done without the pledge from our membership. We're excited to continue this partnership in years to come.

Point of Interest

Lake Willoughby and Willoughby State Forest is one of the crown jewels of Vermont's state lands. The Vermont Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation is tasked with managing these public lands and carefully balancing the sometimes-conflicting needs of public resources and public use. This work is not without its challenges and, due to the strong uptick in use during the covid pandemic, it has been more difficult than ever.


To help address visitor safety and get vehicles off Route 5A, crews have been working to complete the overflow 'ballfield' parking lot and the new lots near the South End of Lake Willoughby. Work should be substantially completed this fall.

In partnership with NorthWoods Stewardship Center, FPR has also been working to address impacts to shoreline areas near the West Cove Beach. Over two seasons, NorthWoods watershed and trail crews have focused on shoreline restoration practices- planting trees, delineating buffers, and mitigating trailside impacts, which are primarily the result of high use and unauthorized camping and fires.

With the aid of District staff and a 'Roving Ranger', we continue to provide outreach to visitors and to monitor the area on a regular basis. Heading into winter, we will continue strategize ways to better protect this very special part of the Vermont landscape.

More broadly, FPR is working with contractors, partners, and volunteers to maintain the many access points, roads, and trails in and around Willoughby State Forest. Of particular note, and with support from the Westmore Association, a team of NorthWoods youth completed some much-needed maintenance of the Bald Mountain cabin, and a private contractor was hired to replace the damaged roof on the summit fire tower.

We appreciate the support and collaboration of the Westmore Association and local volunteers to help steward the natural resources of the Willoughby region.
